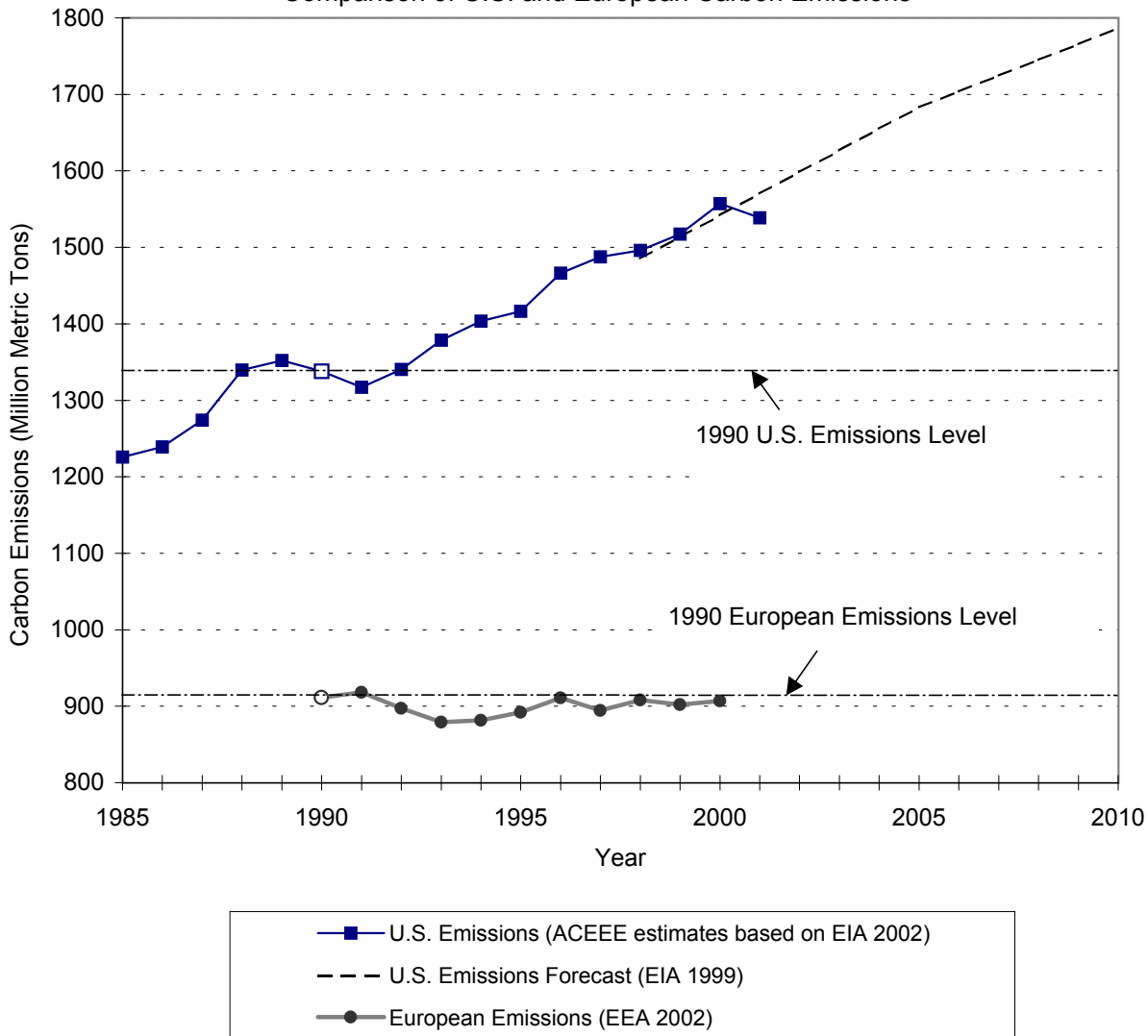


ACEEE's 2001 Carbon Scorecard
