

2024 CITY CLEAN ENERGY SCORECARD Milwaukee, WI

Milwaukee was one of the weaker performers among its peers, but it rose in the rankings from the previous scorecard. Milwaukee performed best in the community energy infrastructure category and has the most room to improve in the community-wide initiatives category.

- \rightarrow Take an equity-driven approach to shared,
- Work with utilities to formalize partnerships with community-based organizations.
- Update zoning code to facilitate locationefficient development.
- \rightarrow Implement clean energy workforce development initiatives targeting disadvantaged communities.
- Adopt a policy requiring efficient outdoor lighting.

COMMUNITY-WIDE INITIATIVES



Milwaukee has a goal to reduce GHG emissions, but there was not sufficient emissions data to determine if it is on track to meet this goal. Milwaukee has a Climate and Economic Equity Task Force charged with making recommendations on meeting Milwaukee's emissions reductions goals and mitigating racial and income inequity through green jobs.

Milwaukee is required to follow statewide codes, including the Wisconsin Uniform Dwelling Code and the Wisconsin Commercial Building Code. The city works with USDN to advocate for more-stringent state energy codes. Milwaukee offers a variety of incentives and financing options for energy efficiency, including some targeted to housing affordability.



TRANSPORTATION POLICIES

16.5/70 Points Milwaukee has not recently updated its zoning code to facilitate location-efficient development, nor does the city require new developments to install EV charging stations. Milwaukee partners with Bublr to provide discounted bike share to residents receiving aid.

COMMUNITY ENERGY INFRASTRUCTURE

We Energies and Focus on Energy provide programs targeted to low-income customers. Milwaukee signed an MOU with the Focus on Energy small business program to market the program as part of its Me2 outreach efforts, and the city has submitted comments to the Public Service Commission expressing its support for strong energy efficiency spending.



LOCAL GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS

Milwaukee recently wrapped up a \$2 million ESPC and performed a comprehensive energy assessment of all municipal buildings. Milwaukee has a capital allocation in the city budget each year to make energy efficiency improvements. Roughly 15% of streetlights are LEDs.

EOUITABLE PRACTICES: 14.5/85.5 POINTS

Each chapter of the City Scorecard included metrics assessing equitable practices cities are taking to advance clean energy, totaling 85.5 points available across the Scorecard.
