

Capital costs are a major barrier to increasing deployment of electric transit vehicles. Yet, electric transit buses generate real value to a variety of stakeholders. For example, electric buses have lower fuel costs and maintenance expenditures than diesel vehicles, reducing operating costs for transit agencies. Electrifying transit buses creates value for utilities by increasing the demand for their product (electricity) and by offering an opportunity to flatten the electrical load and stabilize demand. Electric transit buses also reduce carbon emissions, providing a financial value in some regional markets. The panel will explore business models that would leverage the value of electric transit buses to fund and / or finance their capital costs and accelerate development of the market for these vehicles.

JEFFREY W. ECKEL Hannon Armstrong

Mr. Eckel is President, CEO and Chairman of Hannon Armstrong (NYSE:HASI), the first clean energy REIT and a leading investor in sustainable infrastructure assets including efficiency and renewable energy. With an investment thesis that superior risk-adjusted returns will be achieved by investing on the right side of the climate change line, Hannon Armstrong has been a leader in measuring and tracking greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and invests only when incremental GHG emissions are neutral to negative. Mr. Eckel has led Hannon Armstrong in the role of President and CEO since 2000, and was also with the firm from 1985 to 1989. Previously, he held senior executive positions as CEO of EnergyWorks, LLC and Wärtsilä Power Development. He currently serves as a member on the Board of Directors for the Alliance to Save Energy, the President's Council of Ceres, Inc., the Cornell University Program in Infrastructure Policy advisory board and the Johns Hopkins Environmental, Energy, Sustainability and Health Institute's advisory council. Mr. Eckel has over 30 years of experience in structuring, executing and operating energy and infrastructure investments. Mr. Eckel received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Miami University in 1980 and a Master of Public Administration degree from Syracuse University, Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, in 1981.

Mr. Hookham has over 36 years of experience in the electric power and other heavy industrial sectors, involved with project development, strategic planning, engineering, and EPC delivery of domestic and international projects for industrial, utility and independent power producers. 
