Before this stopgap measure is up in mid-November, Congress will need to turn to funding for the remainder of the fiscal year. We are advocating for substantial funding for energy efficiency programs in the Department of Energy (DOE) and across the federal government, as Senate lawmakers have proposed. House members have proposed deep cuts.

## **Efficiency Update**

Members of the U.S. Climate Alliance, a bipartisan coalition of 25 governors, announced a
series of commitments to help decarbonize buildings, including an agreement to
collectively reach 20 million heat pump installations by 2030. Several states in the group
made new pledges to explore the adoption of building performance standards, explore the

development of clean heat standards, and take actions to align buildings-sector utility resource planning and procurement policies with state climate goals.

Three new DOE <u>reports</u> identify technology pathways to accelerate industrial
decarbonization. In each of the eight industrial sectors analyzed, the reports find that
energy efficiency measures should be among the first solutions implemented to costeffectively reduce emissions. Also vital are low-carbon substitutions for raw materials and
electrification of process heat—key focuses of ACEEE's work on concrete/cement
decarbonization and the <u>Industrial Heat Pump Alliance</u>. The reports build on last year's
<u>Industrial Decarbonization Roadmap</u> and will further help inform DOE's implementation of
recent federal funding.

#### **News You Can Use**

Resources that may be helpful to community-based organizations and others in the energy efficiency sector:

Through the <u>Communities Local Energy Action Program (LEAP) Cohort 2</u>, DOE will
provide technical assistance services valued at more than \$18 million to support 24–32

communities to develop and advance their own community-driven clean energy transition approaches. Eligible applicants are low-income, energy-burdened communities that are either disadvantaged or experiencing direct economic impacts from a shift away from historical reliance on fossil fuels. Multi-stakeholder applicant teams must include at least one community-based organization and one local government or tribal entity. The application deadline is December 14.

- <u>Climate Nexus's Energy Equity Grants</u> seek to connect frontline, Black, Indigenous, and people of color-led groups with resources to continue or increase their efforts against gas expansion and to promote building electrification. The grants prioritize groups with an annual budget of \$1 million or less to boost their efforts in racially, ethnically, gender, and culturally diverse communities across the United States. Grants range from \$20,000 to \$40,000. The application deadline is October 11.
- As new guidance is released for federal funding for energy efficiency retrofits, resilience upgrades, and electrification for low- and moderate-income housing, Residential Retrofits for Energy Equity (R2E2) will post resources to help communities navigate the funding and ensure that the benefits of these funds flow to low-income and marginalized communities. Two recent resources are Federal Funding FAQs and a short resource intended for states, local governments, retrofit program administrators, and CBOs looking to support participation in the Department of Housing and Urban Development's Green and Resilient Retrofit Program.
