

Energy Legislation

ACEEE senior policy advisor Lowell Ungar testified before the U.S. House Energy and Commerce Committee about pending bipartisan legislation to promote energy efficiency. Sens. Rob Portman, R-OH, and Jeanne Shaheen, D-N.H., touted Ungar's analysis, which shows the Energy Savings and Industrial Competitiveness Act could save consumers \$51 billion in lower utility bills through 2050, mostly by making homes and buildings more energy efficient. A sweeping bill is pending in the Senate that may or may not include the provision — stronger building codes —that delivers most of these savings. Better together: Energy efficiency, solar, and battery storage
