We are excited to be entering a new phase of the Residential Retrofits for Energy Equity initiative's work to jumpstart energy upgrades in affordable housing. The initiative is <u>launching</u> <u>partnerships</u> with government offices and local partners in four localities across the United States to bring upgrades, such as heat pump installations and insulation, that will lower households' energy costs and reduce emissions.

As we head into fall, we are gearing up for our <u>Energy Efficiency as a Resource</u> conference next month in Denver. A key focus of this year's event is the role of efficiency efforts in helping utilities and policymakers meet the challenge of rapid electric load growth while maintaining power reliability and customer affordability.

We're also looking forward to <u>Energy Efficiency Day</u>, which is on October 1. This annual public awareness event is an opportunity to spread the word that energy efficiency saves money, cuts pollution, and creates good jobs.

• The Louisiana Public Service Commission approved new <u>rules</u> that will increase investor-owned utilities' annual spending on efficiency programs by about 50% next year and double it within four years. The rules replace a canceled 2024 framework that had shifted the program to a third-party administrator. The new version moves program administration back to investor-owned utilities, while maintaining a 15% funding set-aside for low-income programs that was introduced last year.

- The Massachusetts Department of Public Utilities recently approved a <u>new seasonal</u> <u>electric rate</u> for Eversource customers who use heat pumps. The department approved similar rates for Unitil and National Grid customers in 2024, so now customers of all three Massachusetts investor-owned electric utilities will be able to enroll in the seasonal electric rates to save money when using their heat pumps this winter.
- Residents of the Philadelphia area are facing major travel disruptions after the
 Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority—the fifth largest transit system in the
 country—recently implemented 20% cuts to bus and train services. The cuts follow a
 stalemate in the state legislature over how to fund the agency, with a plan to use sales tax
 revenue stalling in the Senate.
